There are good transport links to Durham, Darlington and Bishop Auckland.

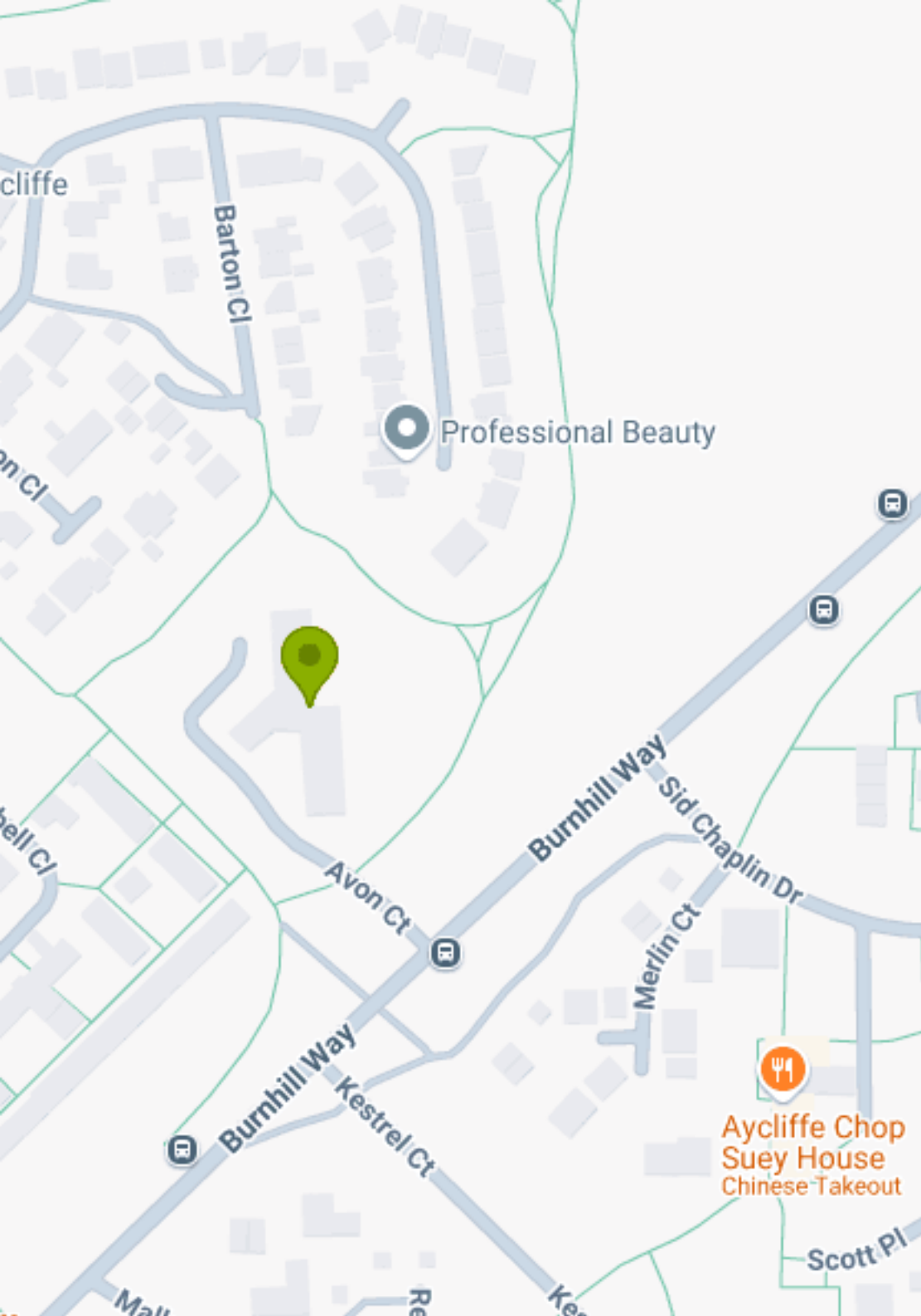
