Please note, we are currently only accepting applications for studio apartments.

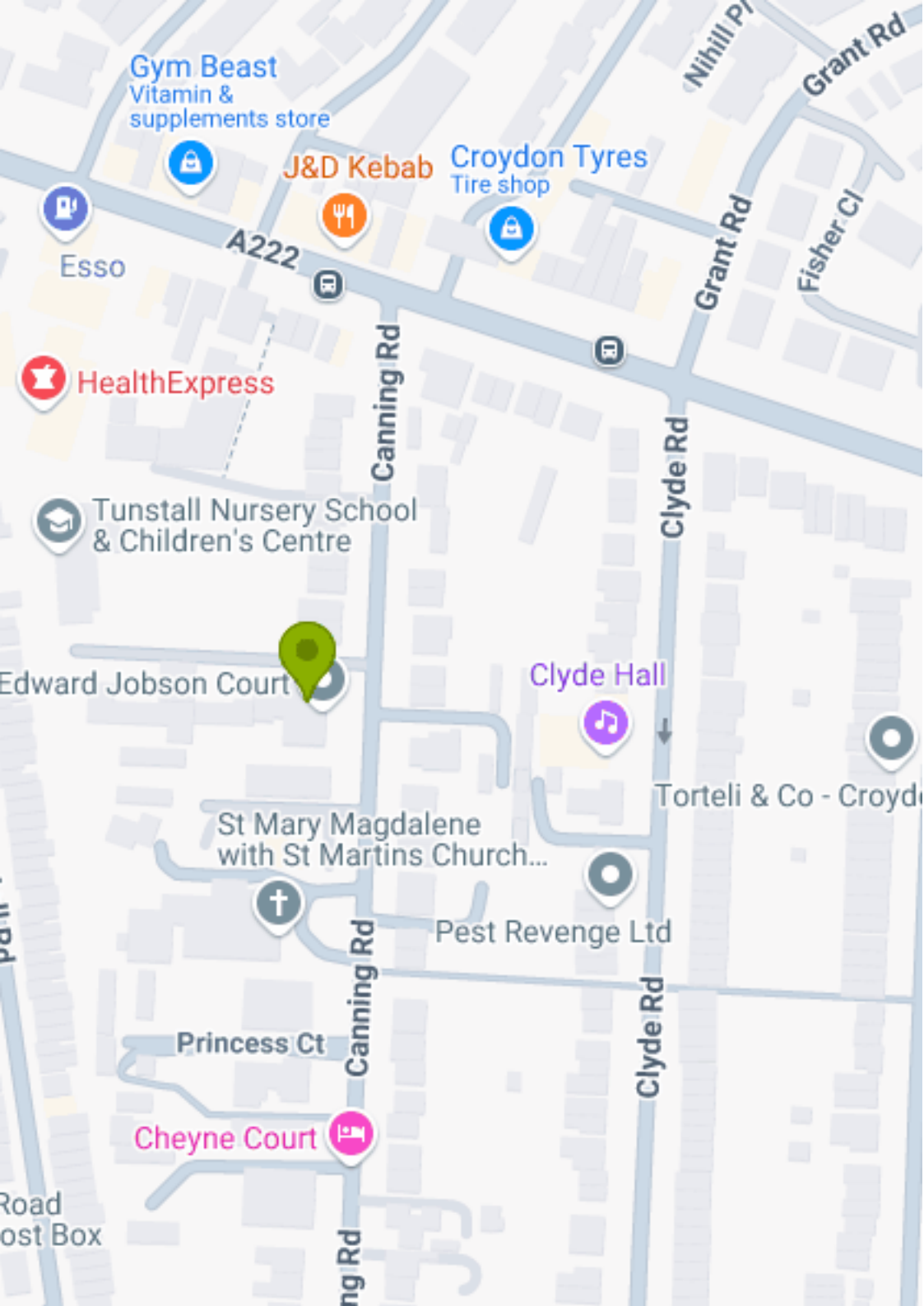
