100 Years of Council Housing - your stories

Mrs Beryl O'Brien Lido House

Beryl O'Brien is now 82 and her family (at the time, husband Jim and two children) moved into their Saddleworth Council home, 66 Queensway, Greenfield in 1961. Their third child was born whilst they lived there.

This was a 3 bedroom, end terraced house, with gardens front and rear and bathroom and toilet upstairs. This was in sharp contrast to the back to back house they had rented in Diggle, which was a terrace, with no bathroom and an outside tippler toilet. What a relief to leave the tin bath!

Beryl's husband sadly passed away in 1991 and the children had grown up and left home, but Beryl stayed on in the house until February this year, before moving to her present home in Lido House, Grotton, after 58 years in Queensway!

She was very reluctant to leave, having had so many happy years there and having grown up with many of her neighbours. However, she was experiencing some difficulties, having a few



falls, toiling with the stairs and having to pay someone to mow the grass. First Choice Homes had done wonders with the house, but Beryl decided it was time to move on and she has settled in well at Lido House. She joins in all the activities in the lounge and is very happy there.



Betty Edmunds, School House Flats

Betty was born in central Manchester in 1920, not far from Shudehill. At that time, her family lived in a two up, two down terrace, with no bathroom and an outside toilet – bath time was in a tin tub in front of the fire!

The family (Mum, Dad, Betty and her younger brother) first moved into a Manchester Council home in 1935, when Betty was aged 15. The house was a 3 bed semi, located near Heaton Park and had gardens front and back, with an upstairs bathroom and an inside toilet downstairs. It was a world away from the old terrace and Betty spent several happy years with her family in the house, until joining the army in 1942.

Betty's service in the army saw her based in Salisbury and Leeds and during this period, she met her husband, Arthur (who was in the R.A.F.) and they married in 1944. They both left the army at the end of the war and moved to Nottingham, where Arthur had found work. At this time, they lived in a Council house as lodgers, living with a middle aged couple, who were the tenants. Their eldest child, a son, Arthur was born in Nottingham in 1947. but Arthur senior was an Oldham lad and couldn't settle, so they moved back to this area around 1950.

At that time, it was very difficult to get a Council property and

the couple spent 3 years moving between their parents' homes. Their second child, daughter Hilary, was born in 1950, whilst the family lived with Betty's mum. They were eventually awarded their own Council house in 1953, a 2 bed house on Lower Lime Rd, Limeside, where youngest daughter Alison was born in 1958. They lived there for 11 vears, before moving to a 3 bed house on Limeside Rd, where the children grew up, got married themselves and moved on. It was here that Betty's husband Arthur sadly passed away in 1983.

Betty stayed in the house until 1991, when she moved into her current home at School House Flats. She's seen huge changes in the scheme in her time there – she remembers it being a bit like a prison when she first moved in, because of the painted brick walls! She's seen many people come and go, but has spent many happy years there.

Mrs Alma Green, Violet Hill Court

Alma Green, who will be 86 years old in May, first moved into a Council home, with her parents and younger brother, Leslie, at a very young age (4 or 5). This was a 2 bedroom house on Thackeray Rd, Derker, where she lived until 1950, when she joined the army at the age of 17.

In between, she'd attended Watersheddings and then Derker schools, leaving at the age of 15 to work 2 years at the Cairo Mill, which was still a cotton mill in those days.

Alma met her husband whilst serving in the army and they married in 1954. After leaving the forces, she went back to work at the Cairo Mill for a short time and at this time she lived with her grandma in Rock St – her husband was still in the army. After his return, they rented a terraced house on Douglas St, but the house came under C.P.O. in the early 1960's and Alma and the family (by this time, they had 3 children) moved into a brand new upstairs maisonette at Albert Mount, Derker.

Unfortunately, Alma and her husband separated whilst the children were still quite young, so she ended up as a sole parent with the 3 children. The fact that she had to access the maisonette via a staircase never caused her any concerns though and they had many happy years there.

Alma lived there over 30 years, but towards the end, the estate went downhill, with



quite a lot of anti-social behaviour and some difficult people. The children had grown up and moved on, so Alma moved to her present home, Violet Hill Court in Waterhead, in 1996.

She's loved her time there and feels safe and secure, having made many friends over the years. She's been a regular in the lounge, but has had to slow down a bit – but she still gets to the bingo!

ROC Litter Pick at Holts Village!

A small group of residents, including young people, Cllr Jenny Harrison and ROC staff braved the rainy weather on Saturday morning 27th April to do a litter pick on the estate starting and finishing at ROC 'n' Rolls.



In the space of just over an hour the team managed to make an impact on several streets plus identified fly tipping areas to pass details onto to the Council. The team plan to do more litter picks, making them a regular event and want more people to help out!

TOG Mind and Housing 21 Work





Our Community Development Officer Gary has had the pleasure of visiting several of the Housing

21 establishments, after contacting Tejinder Birk,

Partnerships Manager, it was agreed to go along and speak to some of the tenants, initially to see if there would be any interest and value in TOG Mind talking to residents about Mental Health and Wellbeing.

After talking to tenants at School House Flats it was felt that there would definitely be a demand for some TOG Mind interventions, we talked at length about what kind of activity may be a good starting point, and collectively settled on a Mindfulness Taster, mainly because it involved chocolate!

Feedback from all the Courts has been very positive, people found the techniques really useful and felt they would continue to use them to help with their overall wellbeing.



Candles - Fire Risk & Safety Advice

Following a small fire in one of our homes we want to remind all tenants of the fire risk which candles create.



THIS IS PARTICULARLY IMPORTANT FOR PEOPLE LIVING IN GROUP SCHEMES.

Candles in the home are becoming more popular however this causes an increase in candle related fires. Candles mark special occasions and create a special atmosphere but they also bring fire into your home, so treat them very carefully.



THE DO'S AND DONT'S

- Always put candles on a heat resistant surface. Be especially careful with night lights and tea lights, which get hot enough to melt plastic. TVs are not fire-resistant objects
- Put them in a proper holder. Candles need to be held firmly upright by the holder so they won't fall over. The holder needs to be stable too, so it won't fall over either
- Position them away from curtains. Don't put candles near curtains or other fabrics or furniture. And keep them out of draughts
- Don't put them under shelves. It's easy to forget that there's a lot of heat above a
 burning candle. If you put it under a shelf or other surface then it can burn the surface.
 Make sure there's at least three feet (one metre) between a candle and any surface
 above it
- **Keep clothes and hair away.** If there's any chance you could lean across a candle and forget it's there, put it somewhere else. You don't want to set fire to your clothes or hair
- Keep children and pets away. Candles should be out of reach of children and pets
- **Keep candles apart.** Leave at least four inches (10cm) between two burning candles
- Take care with votive or scented candles. These kinds of candles turn to liquid to release their fragrance, so put them in a glass or metal holder
- Don't move them when they're burning. Extinguish candles before moving them. Also, don't let anything fall into the hot wax like match sticks
- **Don't leave them burning.** Extinguish candles before you leave a room. Never go to sleep with a candle still burning. And never leave a burning candle or oil burner in a child's bedroom
- Use a snuffer or a spoon to put them out. It's safer than blowing them, which can send sparks and hot wax flying
- Double check they're out. Candles that have been put out can go on smouldering and start a fire. Make sure they're completely out.

New Telephone lines and New Providers

When you are changing to a new telephone provider or other television package that require you to have new phone line, please remember that you need to provide H21 as part of your Tenancy a standard PSTN telephone line.

Sky or Virgin will often provide an IP or VOIP telephone line but these will not work with your Helpline system we need a PSTN rated phone line.

If you live in a bungalow we also require a slave phone socket to be located in the loft which must be connected by your provider at the time of the installation.

There is a charge of between £45 and £80 (depending on the amount of work required) that we will recharge you if the above items are not provided as we have to ensure all our Tenants have a connection to the Helpline Service.
