Bowman Court is situated opposite St Alban's Church in Larkhill, a quiet residential area just a short walk from the centre of Blackburn.

There is plenty for residents to do in the local area, with a cinema, bowling alley, museum, parks, the cathedral and pleasant walks along the canal.
