There is car parking and the scheme is close to transport links and local amenities.

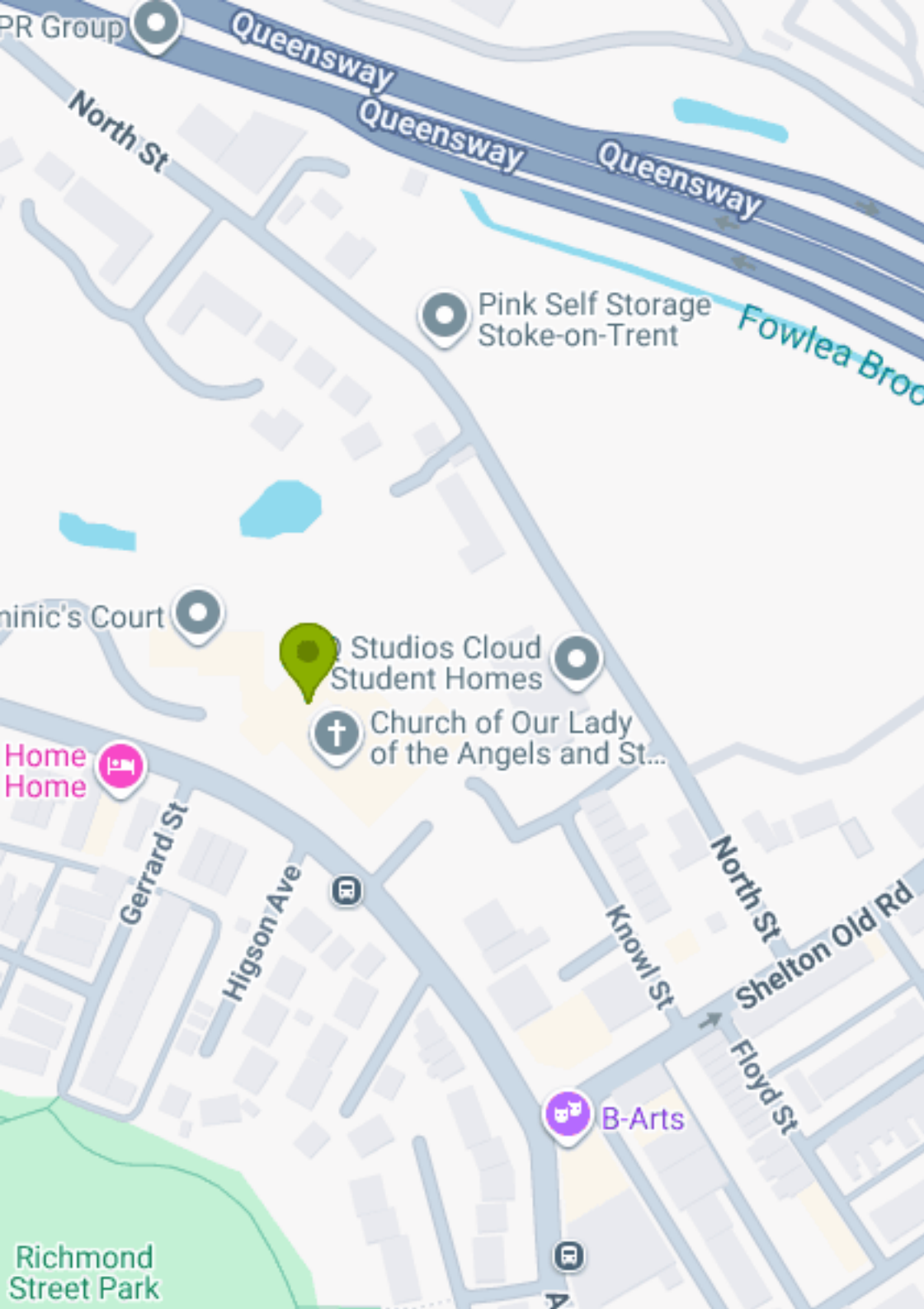
